
## **O**p front



ABSTRACT EXPRESSIONIST BRENDA HEIM and sculptor Doug Hays continue to entertain Eustis with their works of art. Take their collaboration "Poppy Field" at the former Waterman Hospital site, where 100 randomly placed three- to eight-inch-tall red metal poppies dot the grass. The concept emerged during a brainstorming session. Brenda often incorporates a small orange/red dot in some of her abstract paintings as a point of focus. Doug suggested placing the dot on a stick and "planting" it in the ground. Brenda reacted with wide-eyed excitement. "I said no, no... why not 100, like a poppy field?" Doug designed a metal disk suspended on a light gauge steel stem that would move in the wind. They presented the concept to the city, and after approval, 100 were made

and installed. Brenda says she hopes it gives people a momentary respite from their busy lives.


THE POPPY FIELD

## THE FILL UP OF THE FUTURE?

DESIGNERS OF THIS futuristic-looking new addition to downtown Eustis hope someday the station and its clones will become everyday sightings in Lake County. The RubeStation is designed to charge any electrical vehicle that uses 110-volt standard electrical connections. Right now, usage is free, but once retail pricing is established, there will be a charge for a charge. "Our vision is having a plug-in connection available almost everywhere you park," says Bill Ferree, president of RubeLab, the non-profit center for environmental innovation based in Eustis. The center donated the unit to the city in March. Bill sees the RubeStation as a first step in promoting electrical vehicle transportation in the tri-city communities of Eustis, Tavares, and Mount Dora. Local artist Doug Hays (see above) is credited with influencing the design of the station.
